"I am Responsible" 2005 International Convention: Over 44,000 A.A.'s returned to Toronto, Canada to celebrate A.A.'s 70th Anniversary under the theme "I am Responsible". Forty vears earlier on July 4, 1965 in **Toronto's Maple Leaf Garden** 10,000 A.A. members, family and friends joined hands with cofounder Bill W and his wife Lois and repeated for the first time "I am responsible". There were more than 200 meetings and workshops Meetings were also held in several languages including Farsi, Portuguese, German, Spanish, Polish, French, Italian and Japanese to name a few. The 25-millionth copy of the Big Book was presented to a Friend of A.A, the Warden of San Quentin. The first AA group behind prison walls was pioneered by Clinton Duffy in 1942 the warden of San Quentin at that time. Why do we

have a convention every 5 years? For rededication to the primary purpose of A.A. to celebrate the success and growth of A.A. around the world, to let anyone who needs our program and support know that A.A. is available and for that "I Am Responsible".

#### DARK DISTRICT REPORT

A.A exists internationally now and there should be interest in AA beyond our own groups. We need groups to start electing GSRs, intergroup reps. We need districts to elect DCMs and alternates.

At the recent international convention in Canada, our theme was "We Are Responsible!" Well, my AA family, charity starts at home. Our three legacies are Unity-Recovery-Service. The 12 Steps of the first 165 pages of the Big Book are Recovery. The Traditions and the Concepts are Unity and Service. The three legacies are like a three-legged bar stool. We owe it to those that came before us, those that are here now, and those that are yet to walk through the door, for that all of us are responsible!

I ask you pass this message on to all you know in AA and share it at your home group, or get it to groups that are in the dark districts.
