From the Delegate . . .

S ince the General Service

Conference in April, I have logged almost 5,000 miles giving my Conference Report and speaking at other A.A. functions. In May, the area assembly hosted about 75 people who wanted to be the first to hear the news from New York. In June, I spoke to the



Akron and Ashtabula multi-districts which represent 12% and 4% of the groups in our area. In July, I addressed the Cleveland and Westshore multi-districts, which make up 16% and 5% of our groups, respectively. That's roughly a third of our area that cares enough about our Fellowship to ask what happened at the Conference this year. I've spoken in a large clubhouse and in the living room of one of our DCMs. Several of the other area officers have patiently listened to my report more than two or three times at these functions.

I will reiterate my promise of a few months ago. If you ask, I will come to your home group, your district or your club to address as many or as few members as show up. But <u>you</u> have to do the minimal legwork of picking up the phone and calling me or emailing. It's too not much to ask, is it, for the fellowship that saved our lives?

At one of those district visits, I heard a GSR mention that "it's slow in the area during the summer months – not much is going on." *Au contraire*, we are just as busy now as any other time of year. Perhaps you saw the flyers for the Ohio State Convention which was held in Cincinnati in July. Area officers participated in the planning and execution of that convention along with the other three delegate areas in Ohio. During the summer, the delegate gives Conference Reports. The area committee is already planning the fall assemblies. We are working on agenda items that groups want discussed at the 2008 General Service Conference. The Open House picnic was very well attended in Niles, hosted by Districts 6 & 7. The DCM and GSR Workshops held over the summer months were well attended and enjoyed by all.

In August, we held our first planning meeting for the 2008 East Central Regional Convention, which we are hosting the weekend of July 25, 2008 in Westlake, Ohio. This is a big convention of members from all over the great lakes region. It is sure to have some fantastic speakers, panels and workshops. Start planning now to attend.

Coming up in November, Districts 7, 8 & 48 will also be hosting our Gratitude Sunday gathering. The area committee also has plans to attend the East Central Regional Convention in Manitowoc, Wisconsin and the East Central Regional Forum, a free event hosted by GSO in Chicago, Illinois.

There's so much more going on in AA than I can describe in this short article. Won't you come to the assembly and find out?

The following is adapted from a piece found in the Akron Archives written for church archives. I have adopted it for AA, but want to give credit to the unknown author.

Many people feel that history is unimportant. After all, they claim, history deals with the past while we must live in the present and prepare for the future. Those of us who are interested in history often find ourselves trying to explain why it is important to remember and to interpret the past.

Some say that one of the chief values of history is entertainment. It is fascinating to learn about the old timers. We derive enjoyment from listening, seeing and reading about what has happened in the past. Many folks in your home group will find it fascinating to learn more about the men, women and events in group, Area or our worldwide history.

Others claim that the major value of history is inspiration. As we learn more about those who created the Fellowship of which we are so grateful, we may be inspired to give thanks for their lives, and we may pledge to follow their example. On the other hand, recognizing that history is made by people who are not always at their best, their stories may evoke our understanding of their shortcomings and inspire us to say that we shall learn from their mistakes. This, after all, is how our Twelve Traditions formulated.

Finally, we know that the major value of history is that it helps us to understand who we are, from where we have come, and how we can continue to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. It is the key to our own identity.

Archives keep, as Bill W. said, "Myth from becoming reality." How does the Archives Committee

carry the message? What is preserved in the Archives is the message!

While we are not bound by history, we can better understand who we are and, perhaps, help determine the future direction of Alcoholics Anonymous in a changing world by reflecting on the past. History is important. You, your home group, or any service entity you serve on can contribute to AA as you record and remember your service for AA.

A New Look for our Literature

Our literature is an important tool used to carry the A.A. message. Our literature reaches out to the newcomer, expands knowledge and understanding of existing members, and targets professionals and other individuals that will likely come in contact with alcoholics long before they cross the threshold to an A.A. meeting. Our pamphlets have proven to be a valuable asset that delivers a concise, consistent, and affordable message.

Pamphlets for members and newcomers are typically divided into three themes that correspond to our Legacies: Recovery, Unity and Service. Identification of which Legacy the pamphlet applies has been a goal of our publications department. The most recent

identification system, which was not easy to remember, included: recovery pamphlets were a solid color with the title as a flag on cover, unity pamphlets had color steps on a white background with a same-color square in the upper left corner, and service pamphlets had white steps on color background with a square in the center of the steps.

The publications department has begun the process of redesigning pamphlet covers for quicker identification by including large abbreviations R, S, or U on the cover. The changeover will occur as stock is depleted so that no pamphlets are wasted and is expected to be complete by 2008.

Pamphlets targeting professionals will continue to be a solid color with the title at the top. Service material will be continue to be printed on $8-1/2 \times 11''$ yellow paper.

Regional Forums originated in 1975 at the suggestion of the late Chair Emeritus of the General Service Board of Trustees, Dr. Jack Norris. Area Registrar Report

Fellowship New Vision is name of GSO's new the enterprise software system that will allow GSO staff and delegate area registrars maintain the database of registered group contact information. The system is still development. When in complete, the cycle time for group updates will be greatly reduced and more accurate.

Because this project is in development, I have prepared new update forms that correspond to new database fields, such as e-mail addresses. The form has been reorganized for readability and to match data entry screens. The Group Change form is on the Area Web site now, and

other forms will follow soon. I transmitted this to GSO, who thanked me for this effort. GSO's general use form update is due in 2008. On other fronts:

I contacted Klaus K., PI Chair, about Public Service Announcements (PSAs). One of my sponsees, Mike B., has contacted all TV and radio stations in our Area about airing them. Nearly all stations wanted the PSAs! Klaus has now distributed the CDs and with some already tapes **PSAs** airing. These are typically shown at 2:00-3:00 AM, a good time to reach the still-suffering alcoholic.

After the AA Grapevine accepted an article of mine for

the June edition, *Grapevine* editor Robin Bromley, asked me to coordinate the creation of an article on Founders' Day, held at Akron University each June. I collaborated with Gail L., Akron Intergroup Archivist, and co-wrote the article with Jay M., Area 54 Archivist and talented author. The article was published in the September *AA Grapevine*.

After being elected as the East Central Region Program Historian in February at the Conference of Delegates Past and Present, I have begun the task of digitizing their collection of past programs by scanning them and burning CD copies. In Love and Service, Bob McK., Area Registrar

"Conference-approved" — What It Means to You

The term "Conference-approved" describes written or audiovisual material approved by the Conference for publication by G.S.O. This process assures that everything in such literature is in accord with A.A. principles. Conference-approved material always deals with the recovery program of Alcoholics Anonymous or with information about the A.A. Fellowship.

The term has no relation to material not published by G.S.O. It does *not* imply Conference disapproval of other material about A.A. A great deal of literature helpful to alcoholics is published by others, and A.A. does not try to tell any individual member what he or she may or may not read.

Conference approval assures us that a piece of literature represents solid A.A. experience. Any Conference approved booklet or pamphlet goes through a lengthy and painstaking process, during which a variety of A.A.s from all over the United States and Canada read and express opinions at every stage of production.

How To Tell What Is and What Is Not Conference-approved

Look for the statement on books, pamphlets and films:

"This is A.A. General Service Conference-approved literature"

Not All "A.A. Literature" Is Conference-Approved

Central offices and intergroups do write and distribute pamphlets or booklets that are not Conference-approved. If such pieces meet the needs of the local membership, they may be legitimately classified as "A.A. literature." There is no conflict between A.A. World Services, Inc. (A.A.W.S. — publishers of Conference-approved literature), and central offices or intergroups — rather they complement each other. The Conference does not *disapprove* of such material.

G.S.O. does develop some literature that does not have to be approved by the Conference, such as service material, Guidelines and bulletins.

Available at Most A.A. Groups

Most local A.A. groups purchase and display a representative sampling of Conference-approved pamphlets, and usually carry a supply of hardcover books. Conference-approved literature may be available at central offices and intergroups, or it may be ordered directly from G.S.O. Groups normally offer pamphlets free of charge, and the books at cost.

Copyright

Conference-approved literature is copyrighted with the Copyright Office, Library of Congress, Washington, D.C., U.S.A. To insure the continued integrity of A.A. literature, and to make sure the A.A. recovery program will not be distorted or diluted, permission to reprint must be obtained from A.A.W.S. in writing.

However, A.A. newsletters, bulletins, or meeting lists have blanket permission to use the material, providing proper credit is given to insure that the copyrights of A.A. literature are protected.

The A.A. Preamble is copyrighted by The A.A. Grapevine, Inc. (not by A.A. World Services). Beneath it, these words should appear: *Reprinted with permission of the A.A. Grapevine, Inc.* The Steps and Traditions should be followed by these words: *Reprinted with Permission of A.A. World Services, Inc.*
