This letter comes to you from Alcoholics Anonymous - not as a request for anything, but as an offer of A.A. services through you to members of your congregation who may have a drinking problem. Because you are in a unique position to have contact with what we call the "still suffering alcoholic."

The purpose of our A.A. Committee for Cooperation with the Professional Community is to be "friendly with our friends" in all walks of life, so that the A.A. message of personal recovery can reach more of those who need and desire help.

Simply stated, A.A. is a worldwide Fellowship of men and women - over a million of them - who help each other maintain sobriety and who offer to share their recovery experience with others. Anyone who thinks he/she has a drinking problem is welcome at an A.A. meeting.
